After the sudden loss of many grassroot venues in the heart of Bath, the city has not been the same for many musicians. For a single day on the 18th of May, Bath Festivals hosted 'Party in the City', opening up the city to a bustling crowd for aspiring artists.

As I sat in the center of Parade Gardens, the sun beaming over the city, Sober Sundays opened the evening with a warm casual vibe, setting the tone for the night to follow, "Kind of Weak" created an emotional and fulfilling aura for the crowd surrounding the stage. As the music continued to fill the heart of Bath, it lightened up the city in preparation for the summer ahead. Families soon gathered for a ska surprise from Technicolour Steam Train, and Parade Gardens quickly filled with the jous of dance and song from parents, children and friends.

I continued to travel along the paved roads and reached Boom Battle Bar. I was greeted by the raspy, yet soulful tones of Louie Greensmith echoing their music's meaning through a truly passionate performance.

Following was Abby Davies, who's rendition of "Linger" by The Cranberries was one to remember, as her haunting voice sent shivers through the crowd.

Drifting through the heat of the Spring's sun, I walked up from central Bath to St James Wine Vaults where I had the pleasure of seeing Jules Blue's debut performance. A stand-out track was "Too Late to the Partu" perfectly which personified modern-dau feeling FOMO (Fear of Missing Out). Her penultimate song was led by her vocal melody and memorable quitar riff and slowly started to build texture. From ambient guitar works to egg shakers - it was a magical end to a beautiful night.

This semester, beloved CM band The Zaffiros have been doing what they do best – Gigging! Naturally, we wanted to know their tour tips and tricks that get them through those long car journeys and sweaty stages.

Front-man Zak explains how the band started as a brother's duo, gigging in local venues around Exeter. The brothers, Ollie (drummer) and Zak, started by playing crowd pleasing covers, such as Vance Joy's 'Riptide', to gain a name for themselves that would promptly lead to them writing original music together in their family home. Ollie and Zak started to take out their new content to pub gigs, and local festival slots. After this, they began a search for a new bassist in their college, introducing Hugh to the band. Ted recently joined their journey as a guitarist after aiding the band with their studio recordings, discovering new parts to fill out the texture of their songs.

Their debut gig, as a four piece, was no easy feat for them. After undergoing many hindrances to the start of their tour, including an injury to Ollie's shoulder, they never felt as though they had the chance to play as a full band. Due to this, the band recollects Exeter Phoenix in April of 2024 as their first gig as a quartet. During their tour, the boys have found that living the "rock-star life" has been great, but spending time together in new places has been even better. 




The Grapes

I grew up in an underfunded and downright depressed rural town, outlined in rolling fields but congested with derelict buildings left standing as reminders to what once was.

There was little opportunity for music, for colour, for queerness. It doesn't mean that people didn't try – just that the best gig you could get was in the pub, and you were lucky if people turned around from the projection of the football. There were small festivals, where no one gets paid, and the headliner was my guitar teacher's covers band.

In college Moles was the closest actual venue, and it was lauded like playing Wembley, like that was where the world began and ended. It was my Graceland. And somewhere in the walls of that sweaty, grimy basement was something that couldn't be bottled – community, electricity, the feeling like you were doing something real.

I saw friends and strangers play, squeezed onto the arms-width stage as a 10-piece and played to a crowd of people who were actually there to listen. I got so very drunk and I spent so much money and I danced and I span and I kissed so many women and I never once felt worried. I was there so often that the staff started letting me in with a free stamp and a smile. I fell in love with a drummer and I made friends with the scary security guard and I heard the Big Cheese club night playlist so many times I knew what song would be on next.

I felt its loss with a genuine gut punch of grief. Bath's greatest cultural centre with its walls painted over in tepid magnolia and potted shrubberies placed outside the entrance.

Sign the MVT artist pledge. I know some of you reading are gonna figure out how to make money from this music thing we all love (and hate), and making a commitment to keep caring is one way to keep the spark alive.

And if you can get out to that gig, do it. I know it's been a long day and your shift was rubbish but believe me, it's worth it. Nothing lasts forever.




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The Evolution of...



Jake: "Boom Battle Bar", Finn: "That was our first headline so that was pretty fun" Jake: "Actually, the royal oak." Finn: "It was a vibe"

Have you headlined a gig yet?

Finn: "Yeah [Boom Battle Bar], and another in October 4th at St James' Wine Vaults"

Where would you headline if you could?

Charlie: "Exeter phoenix- me and Sam are from around there... I've seen so many other people play there. It's good vibes"

Any releases out yet?

Band Collectively: "Yeah, Don't Turn Around"

Jake: "1562 streams [since being release April 26th]"

What's your release timeline?

Sennen: The EP has been shifted back, probably to be replaced with a single Finn: "We've decided to push an EP back a bit and instead do a summer EP and a winter EP, with the two different vibes of music we make."




Finn Hustler
